## Overview of the College



### School Context

- •Co-educational Secondary College with an approximate current enrolment of 1460 students, including 28 students in our growing International Students Program (ISP). We have approximately 51% male identifying students, and 49% female identifying students.
- •Our learning program is focused on meeting the needs of each individual student, with a focus on the use of evidence to inform teaching and learning, embedding differentiation and inquiry-based learning, and ensuring learning experiences engage and stretch students no matter their starting point.





### School Context



- The College has a focus of high expectations and aims to provide quality educational opportunities that fully develop the potential of all our students.
- •The learning growth of each child is a priority.
- •We commit to ensure a safe and caring environment in which every student feels a strong connection to the College community.
- •Students commit to the values of the College, which are to be encapsulated in the College Respectful Relationships pledge. These values include respect for diversity, care and inclusiveness.



## NAPLAN Results

•The College performed very well in all areas of students learning. Due to the changes in the way NAPLAN is being reported, 2023 cannot be compared to previous years.

#### **Reading**

- •Year 9: 86.5% (60.0% State, 79% Similar Schools) of students achieved in Strong to Exceeding proficiency levels.
- •Year 7: 90.3 % (66.1% State, 84.3% Similar Schools) of students achieved in Strong to Exceeding proficiency levels.

#### **Numeracy**

- •Year 9: 85.8% (59.9% State, 79.3% Similar Schools) of students achieved in Strong to Exceeding proficiency levels.
- •Year 7: 85.7 % (62.9% State, 82.7% Similar Schools) of students achieved in Strong to Exceeding proficiency levels.

Teacher judgements continue to indicate that our Year 7-10 students are performing at a consistently higher level in English and Mathematics compared to the median for all Victorian government schools.



### VCE Results

- •Our median study score was 31.
- •8.1% of student with a study score of 40 or above
- •Median ATAR 72.95, 40% students achieving 80 or above.
- •We had students nominated for Top Art, Top Designs and Top Acts.
- •The College started the journey with implementing the Vocational Major (VM) with the first cohort starting in Year 11. We will have our first graduates of the program this year and it will facilitate new pathways for students at the College.
- •An increasing number of students access VET courses across the northern Melbourne VET cluster.

- •The College is an outstanding learning environment, and our students are at the centre of everything that we do.
- •The College is committed to providing quality teaching and learning, and to challenge students to grow as learners and as individuals.
- •We can achieve strong academic results due to the positive attitudes of our students and the support of passionate and dedicated teachers.
- •The College has breadth in our curriculum program and innovative co-curricular choices.
- •Students can explore and develop interests and passions through our Accelerated program, languages program, STEAM initiatives, Music, Performing and Visual Arts, public speaking, sport and student leadership.

## Learning Supports

- Quality Differentiation
- •Literacy and Numeracy testing has taken place for all Year 7 students (PAT test).
- •Students who are identified as requiring additional support may have access to support through the Tutor Learning Initiative (TLI).
- •The library is open for 'Study Hall' on Thursdays from 3.20pm to 5pm. All students can receive help from teachers and peers during this time.
- •If required, House Leaders will co-construct an Individual Education Plan (IEP) which provides specialised supports and goals for students.



## Accelerated and Enhancement (AE) Program



- •Our AE program is designed to offer gifted and talented learners the opportunity to work in a challenging and stimulating environment with students of similar ability.
- •Suitable students will have academic skills above those of their age peer group, and this is only available to students who have been offered a place at the College.
- •The AE program will not suit everyone, and our teachers are skilled at enhancing all students in all classes via a differentiated curriculum.
- •Only students who have their enrolment accepted at the College can apply to be considered for the AE program.
- •Those students wishing to be considered for the AE class can complete a series of tests (numeracy, general reasoning and literacy) overseen by Edutest. There is a non-refundable fee to complete the tests.
- •Students who gain suitable test scores across all tests will be shortlisted for an interview.

## School Expectations














There is a mandated mobile phone policy for all government schools. The policy means phones brought to school must be switched off and stored securely during the school day.


House Leaders will check in first with students and work with them on low level concerns. A referral will be made to the wellbeing team in consultation with Head of House for more complex cases.

# Co-Curricular Opportunities



## Sport

- Member of School Sport Victoria (SSV) and competes in the Banyule Division, Northern Region and State Level.
- •Whole school sporting days include House Swimming and House Athletics.

## Debating



- •The College is a part of the Debating Association of Victoria (DAV) and partakes in competition Debating.
- •Encourages students to consider contemporary political and cultural issues from all perspectives.
- •Skills developed extend beyond the classroom, and support students to be well informed about their world they live in, and be able to express world views.



### Instrumental Music

- •The College offers several musical instruments to learn, as well as a range of ensembles to join.
- •Instruments include violin, viola, cello, double bass, trumpet, trombone, French horn, tuba, flute, clarinet, saxophone, guitar, electric bass, keyboard, percussion and voice.
- •As part of the ensembles, students have the privilege of showcasing their talents in a variety of settings both within the school and outside the school.





## Production



- •Each year, the College stages two productions: The College Production (Year 7 to 12 students) and the Middle School Production (Year 7 to 10 students).
- •A collaboration between music, dance and drama, involving between 130-150 students on stage, backstage, front of house and a part of the orchestra.



## Tours, Camps and Excursions

- •All Year 7 and 8 students participate in a 3-day, 2-night adventure camp where they participate in activities to extend and challenges themselves.
- •The Music Program offers opportunities to participate in Music Camp, numerous education excursions, community events and engaging overnight tours.
- •All subjects provide excursions or incursions to support students to apply concepts into the real world.





## Language Exchange



- •The College offers opportunities to participate in exchange programs in Germany and Japan for students who study these subjects.
- •Students strengthen their understanding of language and culture and immerse themselves in the language and daily life.
